KEY HIGHLIGHTS

- In April 2017, overnight arrivals to Canada from
 Destination Canada's 11 international markets
 rebounded from the pre-Easter March Iull to average
 +14.6% year-over-year. Destination Canada's ten
 overseas markets soared +35.7% over April 2016, 14
 percentage points over arrivals from non-Destination
 Canada markets, while arrivals from the United States
 rose by 9.3% year-over-year.
- Over the first four months of 2017, overnight arrivals from Destination Canada's ten overseas markets expanded by 21.1%. All ten markets grew at a double-digit pace, led by Latin America (+42.6%), followed by Asia-Pacific (+22.0%) and Europe (+13.9%). Arrivals from the US were up 2.0% YTD April 2017, reaching the highest level since 2005.
- In April 2017, overnight arrivals from Destination Canada's two Latin American markets increased by 86.3% year-over-year, which was attributable to spectacular gains from Mexico (+126.1%) and record April arrivals from both markets. Year-to-date in 2017 both markets achieved new record high arrivals, with Mexico (+56.8%) beating its 2008 record and Brazil (+11.0%) surpassing the peak it established last year.

- DC Europe achieved new record arrivals for both the month of April (+34.0%) and for the first four months of the year (+13.9%) in 2017, exceeding the previous peaks set in 2000. In April 2017, both Germany (+45.7%) and France (+8.5%) achieved new record highs, which were previously established in 2000 and 2012, respectively. Meanwhile, arrivals from the United Kingdom (+47.9%) were second to the peak set in 2000.
- The DC Asia-Pacific markets grew by 23.8% in April 2017 on the basis of strong growth in arrivals from South Korea (+39.7%), India (+37.2%, Australia (+24.7%) and China (+21.6%). Year-to-date 2017, arrivals from all five DC Asia Pacific markets increased by 22% relative to the same period in 2016.
- Following the marked slowdown in March 2017 as a result of Easter occurring later in April this year, US overnight arrivals in April 2017 (+9.3%) rebounded across all three modes of transportation, with air (+12.1%) gaining shares over automobile arrivals (+7.7%) and arrivals by other modes of transportation (+8.9%). Year-to-date, gains in arrivals by air (+6.1%) and other modes of transportation (+4.7%) largely offset a slight contraction in automobile overnight arrivals (-1.0%).

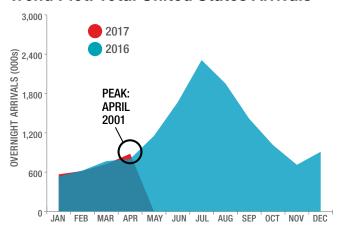

UNITED STATES

- As expected with Easter falling later this year in April, vs. March last year - US overnight arrivals to Canada rebounded in April 2017 following the previous month's year-over-year decline. The gain in total arrivals (+9.3% over April 2016) was observed across all three transportation categories: air (+12.1%), auto (+7.7%), and other modes, such as bus, train, and cruise (+8.9%).
- US arrivals also increased slightly year-over-year over the first four months of 2017 (+2.0%), with increased arrivals by air (+6.1%) and other modes (+4.7%) offsetting the drop in auto arrivals (-1.0%).
- · Ongoing expansion of air capacity between Canada and the US (+5.3% in April, +1.8% YTD) supported the strong growth in air arrivals from the US. The US dollar (-1.7% YTD) also continued to show signs of improved strength against the Canadian dollar in April (+4.8%).

- Looking closer at auto arrivals, the top states of origin for US overnight arrivals by vehicle¹ in April 2017 were New York (21.7% of arrivals), Washington (18.9%), and Michigan (12.0%), with a significant proportion also driving to Canada from New Jersey (5.2%), Massachusetts (5.0%), Pennsylvania (4.5%), and Ohio (4.1%).
- Following two second consecutive months of strong growth, the consumer confidence index published by the US Conference Board retracted 5.5 points to 119.4 in April 2017.

States of origin information is based on Integrated Primary Inspection Lane data collected from US residents entering Canada in automobiles with license plate registered in the United States.

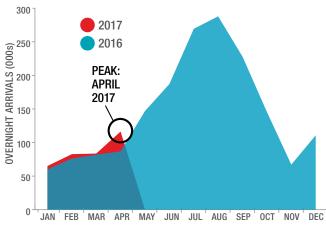

EUROPE

- With 116,403 visitors to Canada in April 2017, Destination Canada's Europe region rebounded from the slowed growth observed in March to achieve remarkable growth of +34.0% year-over-year and setting new monthly and year-to-date records.
- Year-to-date in 2017 arrivals from Destination Canada's Europe region grew +13.9% over the same period last year, thanks to double-digit growth from all three markets - Germany (+16.3%), the UK (+15.6%), and France (+10.2%).
- The UK led the growth in arrivals to Canada in April 2017 (+47.9%), due at least in part to the Easter effect which also contributed to the downward trend in UK visitation observed in March 2017. Increased UK travel to Canada was also supported by the continued expansion of air capacity (+15.0% in April), and did not appear to be hindered by the ongoing significant depreciation of the GBP since the Brexit vote in June 2016.
- · Germany was close behind the UK in year-over-year growth in April 2017, reaching new arrivals peaks for the month of April (25,592, +45.7%) and YTD (68,801, +16.3%). This impressive growth was supported by ongoing air capacity expansion (+13.2% in April).
- France observed relatively slower growth in April 2017 compared to Destination Canada's other European markets, but still achieved new record arrivals peaks for both the month of April (32,339, +8.5%) and the first four months of the year (114,740, +10.2%). Continued expansion of air capacity to Canada (+17.0% in April) supported this performance.

DC Europe Arrivals by Port of Entry

- YTD in 2017, nearly three-quarters of visitors from Destination Canada's European markets arrived by air directly from overseas. UK travellers were the most likely to arrive by land via the US (8.2%), while visitors from France (27.0%) were the most likely to arrive by air via the US.
- · Most direct air arrivals from Destination Canada's three European markets landed at YYZ (40.6%) or YUL (29.5%).

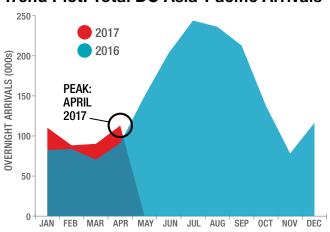

ASIA-PACIFIC

- Arrivals to Canada from Destination Canada's Asia-Pacific region in April 2017 grew 23.8% over April 2016, thanks for record-setting performance from four of the five key markets. China (39,620 visitors in April 2017), India (19,797), South Korea (19,351), and Australia (18,181) all achieved new peaks both for the month of April and the first four months of the year.
- This growth in April 2017 was led by South Korea (+39.7%) and India (+37.2%), followed by Australia (+24.7%) and China (+21.6%), while the Japan market grew at a slower pace (+1.4%).
- Year-to-date over the first four months of 2017, the Asia-Pacific region saw growth of +22.0%, with all five markets recording very strong growth of approximatively 20% relative to the same period in 2016. Again this performance was led by South Korea (+26.2%) and India (+26.0%), followed by Australia (+24.0%), Japan (+21.3%), and China (+18.4%).
- The Asia-Pacific region's performance continued to be supported by ongoing air capacity expansion, particularly in the case of Australia (+104.9% in April), as well as South Korea (+47.7%), India (+39.4%), China (+33.7%), and Japan (+15.2%).

DC Asia-Pacific Arrivals by Port of Entry

- Just over two-thirds of visitors from Destination Canada's Asia-Pacific region were direct air arrivals, with a majority of arrivals from four of the five markets entering Canada this way. The exception was Australia with almost equal numbers arriving either direct (44.9%) or via the US by air (43.6%). South Korea was the only market to see year-over-year growth in arrivals by land via the US (+21.3%) and the most likely to arrive this way (27.5%), followed by India (17.7%).
- Almost all direct air arrivals (93.0%) from DC's Asia-Pacific markets arrived via YVR (54.0%) or YYZ (38.9%), with visitors from India being the most likely to land at YYZ (46.5%) and visitors from China most likely to land at YVR (42.7%). The strongest year-over-year growth was observed for Chinese visitors arriving at YYC (+2179.5%) and South Korean visitors arriving at YYZ (+110.0%).

LATIN AMERICA

- Following a month of slowed but positive year-over-year growth, arrivals from Destination Canada's Latin America region rose sharply by +86.3%, reaching a new peak of 45,138 visitors in April. The region also continued to achieve record arrivals year-to-date (126,291, +42.6%).
- These sharp shifts are attributable to the impact of the Easter effect on the Mexican market, with Easter falling in March last year and in April this year. This led to slowed growth in March 2017 from a market which had displayed a strong upward trend since the replacement of the visa requirement with the Electronic Travel Authority (eTA), followed by a sharp return to positive growth in April 2017. Arrivals to Canada from Mexico recorded spectacular gains in April, jumping +126.1% year-over-year to reach a new peak of 37,437 visitors. This brought total arrivals over the January to April period to a record 95,821 visits, up 56.8% over the same period in 2016 and +50.2% over the previous peak in 2008. This positive trend continued to be supported by significant expansion of air capacity (+36.5% YTD), mitigating the effect of a weaker Peso (-11.5% YTD).
- Meanwhile arrivals from Brazil, which had jumped in March, slowed to +0.4% year-over-year in April 2017. Though this increase was very small in contrast with Mexico, Brazil still achieved record arrivals both for the month of April (7,701) and year-to-date (30,470, +11.0%). This is particularly notable given the ongoing contraction of air capacity to Canada (-34.6% YTD), and may be supported by the recent positive trend observed with the strength of the Real vs. the Canadian dollar.

DC Latin America Arrivals by Port of Entry

- Visitors from Mexico (61.9%) and Brazil (59.7%) primarily travelled to Canada by air direct from overseas. The remainder of Brazilians primarily travelled by air via the US (36.9%), while Mexicans travelled through the US both by air (20.7%) and by land (17.4%).
- Almost all direct air arrivals from Brazil landed at YYZ (93.9%), while those from Mexico usually arrived at either YYZ (46.2%) or YVR (33.8%).

- Over the first four months of 2017, Canada welcomed nearly 40% more international visitors than Australia (4.15 million vs. 2.98 million), with the difference in the pace of year-over-year growth between the two countries narrowing (+6.7% for Canada, +6.9% for Australia).
- Canada also welcomed more than twice as many travellers from Destination Canada's 11 core international markets than Australia (3.67 million vs. 1.65 million) over this period, though Australia continued to record slightly stronger year-over-year growth in arrivals from these markets (7.6%, vs. 6.0% for Canada).
- More than 9 times more US travellers visited Canada (2.79 million) than visited Australia (274,600) from January to April 2017, but this market continued to grow at a faster pace in Australia (+12.0%) than in Canada (+2.0).
- By contrast, Australia continued to receive significantly more visitors from each of Destination Canada's Asia-Pacific markets, particularly from their key market of China. However, with year-over-year growth averaging approximately 20% from all four markets, Canada continued to make good progress in this region with much faster growth than Australia observed from these markets.
- Year-to-date in 2017, Australian arrivals to Canada (70,961, +24.0%) outpaced Canadian arrivals to Australia (69,600, +15.4%) both in total visitors and in year-over-year growth.

- In line with previous observations, nearly half of international arrivals to Canada year-to-date in 2017 crossed the border through Ontario (1.96 million, 47% of total arrivals). Ontario was also the only province to record year-over-year growth across the board, with increased arrivals from US residents by automobile (+1.6%), US residents by other modes (+10.5%), and overseas visitors (+24.6%).
- The biggest year-over-year increases in international arrivals were recorded in Ontario (+189,922 additional visitors), British Columbia (+36,383), Quebec (+21,219) and Alberta (+15,518), mainly due to more overseas visitors.
- The slight decrease in US auto arrivals to Canada yearto-date in 2017 was apparent across most provinces, except Manitoba (+10.9%) and Ontario (+1.6%).

- Overnight trips by Canadians to all international destinations increased in April 2017, reaching 3,044,286, up 10.7% year-over-year. The number of overnight trips by Canadians to the US increased for a fifth consecutive month, up 14.9% (+12.0% by air, +17.2% by auto, +19.7% by other modes). Meanwhile, overnight trips to non-US overseas destinations grew 4.9% year-over-year.
- Over the first four months of 2017, Canadian overnight travel to international destinations increased by 6.2%. Trips to the US – up 7.8% – outpaced trips to other international destinations - up 4.4%.
- Following two consecutive months of increases, in April 2017 the Canadian Consumer Confidence Index (published by the Conference Board of Canada) fell 2.3 points to a still-optimistic 109.4.

- The National Occupancy Rate inched up by a marginal 0.9 points year-over-year in April 2017, currently sitting at 61.7% and bringing the year-to-date occupancy rate up to 57.3%, up 1.4 points over the same period in 2016.
- In April 2017, the highest occupancy rates were observed in British Columbia (67.5%), Ontario (66.3%), and Manitoba (64.5%). Year-to-date, Manitoba (63.5%) and British Columbia (62.5%) were also top performers, but Northwest Territories (72.8%) took the top spot.

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- British Columbia, Quebec, and Ontario recorded the highest average daily rates (ADR) and revenue per available room (RevPar) in April 2017, with Ontario in particular recording the strongest year-over-year growth on both measures. British Columbia and Quebec were also top performers on both measures year-to-date, along with Northwest Territories.
- Ongoing year-over-year declines across accommodation measures continued to present challenges for several provinces and territories, including Saskatchewan and Northwest Territories. Alberta's ADR continued to fall, but there are signs of improvement in occupancy rate and RevPar.

- Consistent with past trends, both occupancy rate and ADR increased with the size of the property, with the largest properties (500+ rooms) reporting the highest occupancy rates (70.5% in April, 66.0% YTD) and average daily rates (\$198.46 in April, \$196.81 YTD). These larger properties also noted the strongest year-over-year growth on both measures, both in April and year-to-date in 2017.
- Suite hotels continued to record the highest occupancy rates (73.2% in April, 67.6% YTD), though resorts recorded stronger year-over-year growth on this measure. Resorts also reported the highest ADR (\$190.86 in April, \$221.71 YTD), as well as the strongest year-over-year growth, though all property types observed relatively strong growth in ADR over this period.
- Upscale properties continued to report the highest occupancy rates (66.2% in April, 63.5% YTD) and ADR (\$221.88 in April, \$224.31 YTD), though again a positive trend in ADR was observed across all price levels.

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
